COLONOSCOPY: WHY & WHEN

Why: Colorectal Cancer is a preventable disease and it is the second leading cause of cancer death in the US. Precancerous lesions can be removed and it will also detect early cancer. Last year, approximately 154,000 patients were diagnosed with colorectal cancer and about 52,000 patients died from this cancer. With the appropriate screening most of these deaths could have been prevented.

When: if you have no risk factors, screening should start at age 50 and then be repeated every 10 years with a flexible sigmoidoscopy every 5 years. You should also have your stool checked every year for blood.

There are certain people who have a higher risk for colorectal cancer.

I. African-Americans should start screening (ie colonoscopy) at age 45. The reason for this is:

A. they have a higher risk and that risk starts earlier (most before age 50)

B. there are lower survival rates and they generally present with a much more advanced disease.

2. People with a family history of colorectal cancer and other cancers: these people should start screening at age 40 or 10 years before their relative was diagnosed with cancer.

3. Patients with ulcerative colitis or Chron's: these patients general, a preventable disease should be followed by a gastroenterologist.

4. Hereditary nonpolyposis colorectal cancer: these patients have an 80% chance of developing colorectal cancer: screening should start at age 21.

They should also be referred for genetic counseling, If any family member had cancer - they should start screening 10 years before that relative developed cancer.

5. Familial adenomaxous polyposis: all of the patients will develop, at some point, colorectal cancer unless the colon is surgically resected. Screening colonoscopies should start at age 10.

Polyps: the usual types of polyps are called adenomas and hyperplastic polyps.

Adenomas are pre-cancerous. These types of polyps increase with the aging process. If a polyp is found in a person of 65-75 years of age, 35-50% will be adenomas.

In general, hyperplastic polyps (with certain exceptions) are not pre-cancerous.

I realize that this is just a general over-view. Do have a colonoscopy when your physician recommends such. The worst part is the preparation - you will, more than likely, be asleep for the test. As stated before, colorectal cancer is, in general, a preventable disease
