Electronic Cigarettes

These are also called E-cigs. These are advocated as a way to stop smoking but they are not approved by the FDA for this purpose. Over the last few years their use has been rapidly increasing - and this is not just among smokers but also non smokers.

Besides being used as a way to stop smoking, they are touted as a socially acceptable alternative to smoking real tobacco.

As you must all know, they are available in most drug stores, convenience stores, etc as well as by internet purchase.

What are they? there are two different models: as re-chargeable devices: and a one time use E- cig. There are those that have a light on the end to make it look like a lit cigarette. Both produce a vapor that looks like cigarette smoke. There are several brands and depending on which one is used it will be equivalent to 1 pack to almost 1 carton of regular cigarettes. They have different flavors and contain from 16mg of nicotine to 0.

There is a small trial that compared the E-cig to the nicotine patch to those who wanted to stop smoking. By a very small percentage the E-cig was better.

Most of the E-cigs contain small amounts (less than a real cigarette) of carcinogens.

Possible side effects of E-cigs are: cough, mouth and throat irritation, sneezing, and most important, in non smokers, possible nicotine addiction and therefore possible cardiovascular risk factors.

Cool Places to Fly by Chris Houston

For this month, we'll stay in New York State and visit some living history.

Because this is a new addition to the newsletter, feedback on format and content is very welcome. I have several destinations in mind for the coming months, but am open to suggestions on worthy destinations from the membership.

Destination: Ticonderoga Municipal Airport (4B6), Ticonderoga, NY

Distance: 166 nautical miles, direct

Why It's Cool: Ticonderoga, derived from an Iroquois word meaning "where the waters meet", lies east of the Adirondacks on a portage between Lake George and Lake Champlain. As you might

expect from this geography, arrivals by air are treated to magnificent scenic views. Fort Ticonderoga is a beautiful example of a restored 18th century French fort. A plaque at the main gate reminds visitors that they walk in the footsteps of greatness: George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, Ethan Allen, and many others who played key roles in the American Revolution all passed through that portal.

This is a terrific flying destination for families who enjoy exploring historic structures and learning about the history of New York State. Volunteers perform musket-firing demonstrations and give tours in period uniforms. Craftsmen, also volunteer, fabricate clothing and maintain the structure using 18th century tools and techniques. There are several exhibits including actual 18th century military uniforms and weapons. We spent a full, enjoyable day at the fort and still did not see everything (for example, we did not tour the King's Garden).



Admission is \$17.50 for adults, \$15 for seniors, and \$8 for children 5-12. There is also a AAA discount available. Considering that the fort is solely supported by these admission fees, we thought that the prices were reasonable. Food is available on site at the American Fort Café, which is of better quality than I remember museum food being when I was a kid. The fort is open from early May to early November, check the website for hours, details, and special events: <http://www.fortticonderoga.org/>.

Tips: Ticonderoga Municipal is a no-frills facility with a 4,041' paved runway (02-20) that was recently resurfaced. There is no fuel available. The direct flight from KSDC will take you over the Adirondacks and through the Lowville and (potentially) Tupper South MOAs; be cognizant of the terrain and special use airspace when planning your flight. On the day we visited, we had breakfast at

Puddle Jumpers (KFZY), then flew to Ticonderoga via Piseco (K09). Because a security fence surrounds the airport, be sure to note the reentry code prior to exiting the ramp. Transportation from the airport to the fort can be arranged by calling Joe's Taxi – Ticonderoga (518-585-4412) or Adirondack Cab (518-585-2222). Call in advance, both are small operations that are sometimes unavailable because of out-of-town runs. Cy from Adirondack Cab charged a one-way fare of \$6 to reach the fort. He was waiting for us when we landed and gave us a nice driving tour of town on the way back to the airport.
