Cool Places To Fly by Chris Houston

Destination: Bradley International, Winsor Locks, CT (KBDL)

Distance: 211 nautical miles, direct

Why It's Cool:

Bradley International is a Class Charlie airport very similar in many ways to Rochester. The primary difference between it and Rochester, however, is the presence of the <u>New England Air</u> <u>Museum</u> (NEAM) located right on the field.

NEAM boasts a range of aircraft in its collection, civil to military, pistonpowered to turbine. There is a large sampling of World War II aircraft including classics like the Thunderbolt, a Hellcat, an A-26, and a Corsair. The crown jewel of the WWII collection is the B-29 Superfortress "Jack's Hack".

Given its location in Connecticut, local manufacturer Sikorsky is wellrepresented by multiple helicopters and the massive VS-44A flying boat "Excambian".

All of NEAM's aircraft on display are in excellent condition. There are rare exhibits too, like a fully restored Goodyear blimp control car. This museum is a step above the typical and well worth visiting for those who enjoy old air-

Tips:

- Bradley operates similarly to-Rochester. Its operational statistics show a few more operations per day than Rochester, 256 versus 242 (per AirNav).
- The downside to landing at Bradley is the price of access. There are two FBOs on the field, TAC Air and Signature.
- Although Signature is closer to the museum and on the correct side of the airport to reach the museum easily, it is the most expensive. Current fees for a single engine piston aircraft at Signature include \$20 for landing, \$44.10 for parking, and \$55 for handling. The handling fee can be waived with purchase of 18 gallons of fuel (currently \$7.45/gal).



Thus, total cost for parking is \$119.10 without fuel.

- TAC Air's prices are more accessible. Fees include \$18.31 for landing, \$20 for parking, \$15 for handling, and \$7 for infrastructure. The handling fee is waived with a fuel purchase of 10 gallons or more (currently \$6.90/gal). Thus, total cost for using TAC Air is \$60 without fuel purchase.
- Courtesy cars are available and one will be necessary to reach the NEAM from TAC Air. There are options for food in the area, also reachable with a courtesy car.
- Given the high cost of fuel at Bradley, Columbia County (1B1) about 50 nautical miles northwest of Bradley is a recommended fuel stop if one is needed (current pricing, \$4.46/gal).

Member Spotlight: Paula Sippel by Chris Houston

Sometimes, our children show us the way. Such was the case with WFC member Paula Sippel and aviation.

As a child, Paula's daughter Caitlin always wanted to fly. She loved airshows and joined the Civil Air Patrol (CAP) at age 13. Paula joined with her and served as an active Senior Member with CAP for 8-9 years. She also served as a Cadet Program Officer and a Testing Officer, helping to monitor and guide the cadets through their promotions. Not surprisingly, Paula found herself around airplanes frequently. From CAP, Caitlin entered the Air Force Academy and currently flies C-130J aircraft. With a big nudge from Caitlin, Paula finally heeded life's many hints that she belonged behind the controls



of an airplane.

It did not happen right away, though. Paula's introductory flight took place at the Greater Rochester International Airport in 2009 during a WINGS event. She flew 9855W with Mike Bjerga in the right seat. However, a few more years passed before she joined the WFC in 2017 and pursued flight training in earnest. Paula earned her private pilot certificate in August 2018.

Paula expressed tremendous appreciation for the "cool, close-knit club feeling" of the WFC, noting the many members willing to answer questions and impart advice. She adds that those resources are only available, "If you get involved." Taking her own advice to heart, Paula increased her involvement with the club in 2019 by becoming the WFC's newest Director.

As a recently certificated private pilot, Paula fondly recalls her first long cross-country flight post-check ride, a trip planned by the WFC Activities Committee to Lake Placid in October 2018. She and member Brad Roehrig planned the flight together and shared flying duties in N1185X.

She also cites a recent crosscountry flight to Cherry Ridge (N30) in Honesdale, PA as in important flight for her. It was her first cross country flight with husband Steve. All pilots know how important it is to have a supportive spouse. Steve's first flight, his first opportunity to see what general aviation is all about, was a massive success and Paula reports that he's hooked! By trade, Paula is an accountant with Davie Kaplan, where she specializes in personal taxes. She is also certified in Elementary Education and taught for twelve years.

She and Steve are also sailors and – as weather permits – enjoy plying the waters of Lake Ontario when not taking wing.

Aloft, Paula enjoys exploring new airports and sharing the general aviation experience with friends and family. She has already flown with most of her immediate family and eagerly looks forward to bringing this full circle by flying as Pilot in Command with Caitlin.
